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<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Established by great educationist and staunch freedom fighter Late Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray in 1952 with a motto "Bahujan Hitay, Bahujan Sukhay", the parent institute Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir (MGV), Nashik presently runs 110 education units imparting conventional, vocational and professional education. Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray Arts, Science and Commerce College Nimgaon, Malegoan (Nashik) is affiliated to the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Maharashtra, was founded in year 2000 by Dr. Prashant Vyankatrao Hiray to uplift the downtrodden masses through education considering the educational needs of the students. The college was flourished under the visionary leadership of Dr. Prashant Vyankatrao Hiray, Former Minister of Transport and Protocol, State of Maharashtra, Dr. Aapoorva Prashant Hiray, Former MLC, State of Maharashtra and Dr. Advay Prashant Hiray-Patil since its inception. The college has been serving in the rural area. Over a period of time, it has adapted to new changes that have been introduced in the education. The NEP is also not an exception to this; the institute is committed to the changes under the guidelines of NEP 2020. The HEI works on the basis of core values like Academic Excellence, Accountability, Assessment and Improvement, Work Culture, Honesty and Integrity, and Social Responsibility. The college is recognized by UGC under Section 2(f) and 12(B), UGC Act. It has qualified competent and experienced teaching staff. It provides quality education by offering 10 UG and 2 PG Programs admitting over 900 students at present.

- 10 Graduate programmes and 2 Post graduate programmes for wide choice of programmes for students

- Strong extension activities through NSS and excellent performance in Sports and Cultural activities
- Executing Environmental awareness and sustainability, professional ethics, human values and gender sensitivity practices.

Institutional Weakness

- Restriction on appointment of permanent staff by the government
- Limited funds have been receiving. However, the college and the Management tries to manage the issues concerned from own contribution.
- Limited UGC grants to rural colleges
- Parents' conservatism and financial & other limitations regarding education of the ward.
- Being a conventional education college, a limited scope to introduce emerging programmes.
- Limited job opportunities in immediate local society.
- Being a rural college, limited transport facility available for the students to travel to college.

Institutional Opportunity

- To run courses that will help students from rural background to start their own enterprise
- Mould rural students with immense physical and mental potential.
- Being rural college students generally come from agriculture background.

Institutional Challenge

- They have to balance themselves between education and agricultural work. Due to climate change from some years, the agriculture produce is not up to their expectation, hence they have to work somewhere else on daily wages. This diverts their focus from studies. College has to make efforts to find balance between their education and daily needs.
- Girls are being married before the completion of their graduation. The college has to carry regular counselling of their parents, so that the girl student can complete their education.
- Economical and social conditions are some of the hindrances for these students to pursue their education.
- Limitations to achieve excellence in academics by involving masses from socially and economically weaker students from rural background, however, the faculty takes strenuous efforts to overcome it.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The College offers co-education in Arts, Science and Commerce disciplines at the Undergraduate and Postgraduate level.
- The college ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process under the guidance of the Principal and the IQAC.
- The Academic calendar is prepared and followed for guided functioning. The faculties prepare teaching plan and time table accordingly. Weekly teaching reports are submitted. Syllabus completion reports are submitted.
- Continuous Internal Assessment is used effectively.
- The faculty members have actively participated in the syllabi restructuring workshops.
- The college has introduced 02 new UG and 02 PG programmes in the last five years.
- During last five years, the college has introduced new 11 value added/certificate/diploma courses approved by IQAC and the CDC. The syllabi of these courses are designed by the college with a view to add skills and enhance employability of the students.
- The college ensures that through the curriculum, the various cross cutting issues such as gender sensitization, environment and sustainability, human values, professional ethics are inculcated among the students.
- The college has a Feedback system to collect feedback on curriculum, teaching-learning process, support services, infrastructural facilities, etc. from the stakeholders -students, parents, employers, teachers and alumni.
- The analysed feedback and action taken reports are displayed on the college website. They are also forwarded to bodies concerned for further action.
- The feedback is used for improvement and further development as per requirement. The students' suggestions are taken into consideration for corrective measures.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- The teaching learning and evaluation process is effective.
- The college has maintained a good reputation in the vicinity for education.
- Reservation policy of the Govt. is strictly followed in the admission process.
- The College has a well-planned academic monitoring system to evaluate and track the performance of the students.
- The College assesses the learning levels of the students after admission.
- The college faculty adopts student-centric teaching methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences through different activities like filed visits, internship, industrial training and hands on training etc.
- Faculty use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process.
- The use of Laboratory Tools and Hands on Experiences help our students to master skills and to build confidence.
- The college has well qualified faculty involved in teaching-learning and research.
- The faculty members use their expertise in grooming the students well.
- The IQAC ensures the strict implementation of the Academic Calendar by monitoring activities and the gaps in implementation are reviewed periodically and proper corrective measures are taken, if required.
- Performance of the students is evaluated through assignments, unit tests, attendance, seminar, and activity assessment through projects and group discussions/presentations.
- Each department has stated COs, POs and PSOs with assessment strategy. They are well stated and also uploaded on the website of the college.
- There is a proper mechanism to deal with Grievances related to university examination, college examination; the College Examination Officer takes care of it. The system is effective and time bound.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The college is having a well- developed research culture.
- 6 faculties are recognized as research guides for Ph.D.
- College have been organizing workshops/seminars/conferences/webinars on several cutting-edge issues including IPR. From last five years, total 23 of them were conducted.
- There is a noteworthy increase in number of research publications by faculty in reputed indexed research journals. The faculty members have published 115 research papers in the NAAC assessment period (2018-2019 to 2022-2023)
- Total 15 books chapters are published during the NAAC assessment period.
- The college is upholding research culture by signing total 19 functional MoUs, linkages and collaborations with academic and research institutes during last five years.
- Major Extension Activities are organized through NSS to sensitize students on social issues. The extension work of the college has been appreciated by many reputed social institutes.
- The college is running different certificate courses considering the need and interest of the students. 11 certificate courses were run by the college
- Total 80 Extension and outreach activities are conducted by the college during the NAAC assessment period.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college has infrastructure facilities and resources to conduct the curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular, and research activities.
- The college has a campus area of 33500 sq.mt with ICT enabled classroom, Well equipped laboratories, compute lab, gymkhana, administrative office, and well-furnished seminar hall.
- For Physical Education and sports, there is a multipurpose Gymnasium. 200 mtr track is maintained by Gymkhana. The College has Green Gym installed on the college ground. The Physical Education & Sports Department believes in the provision of the distinguished sports facilities.
- Separate Ladies Common Room is available for the girls
- 10kv Solar system has been installed in the college.
- College premises is covered with 24x7 surviellance by 24 CCTV Cameras.
- The college library has an area of 920 sq.ft. It has 5750 text books, e-books, journals, ejournals. 700 reference books, 39000000+ e-books, 115000+ e-journals, 10 CDs.
- Separate spacious reading rooms are provided in the library for students, and teachers.
- A good computer lab along with surfing facility is also made available to the students.
- The Computer Science department is having a well-established IT infrastructure for teaching-learning and practicals.
- The departments are equipped with computers having internet connectivity of 100 mbps speed.
- The college is equipped with 2LCD projectors to facilitate the Modern teaching methods to be adopted.
- A separate team of technicians is appointed by the parent Institution for the IT infrastructure maintenance. It continuously monitors the requirement of different departments and classrooms.
- The ICT facilities are updated periodically as per the requirement. The college has a proper policy for the up-gradation of IT infrastructure.

Student Support and Progression

- The institution extensively forms support systems in areas such as admission, infrastructure, curricular, co-curricular, sports, cultural and extension for overall personality development of the students.
- Government scholarships are made available for students. The college helps economically and socially backward students by providing them with fee concession/waiver, scholarships and support through the faculty and alumni.During last five years, total 980 students were awarded scholarships under different schemes by the Govt. and non-Govt. agencies.
- Economically backward students are helped by 'Earn and Learn Scheme'.
- The students are provided a support for overall development through competitive examination centre, career guidance, personality development, soft skills development, language lab, remedial coaching, value-added courses, Student Welfare Cell, NSS etc.
- Capacity development and skills enhancement activities for developing Soft skills, Language and communication skills, Life skills (Yoga, physical fitness, health and hygiene) ICT/computing skills are organised for improving students' capability.
- Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti- sexual harassment and Anti-ragging Committees are constituted in the college for student grievances.
- For redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases, the college implements of guidelines of statutory/regulatory bodies, organises wide awareness and undertakings on policies with zero tolerance, has mechanisms for submission of students' grievances, and takes care of timely redressal of the grievances through appropriate committees.
- Representation is given to students and alumni in committees like CDC, IQAC, Magazine Committee, Student Welfare Committee, and NSS Committee, etc.
- A number of students have participated in sports and cultural activities from college to the state and

national level during last five years. 19 students have recieved Gold Medal in various sports events at zonal and university level

- A significant number of cultural and sports activities were arranged in the college. During last five years 31 medals or awards are bagged.
- The college has good placement record and a considerable number of students progress to higher education every year.
- The college has a registered Alumni Association and regular meetings are held. The alumni of the college have supported the college through different financial and non-financial means.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The governance and leadership of the college are perfectly in accordance with the vision and mission; it is duly reflected in various institutional practices such as preparedness for NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth of college, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in the Institutional Perspective Plan.
- The college practices decentralization and participative management through College Development Committee (CDC), IQAC and various committees for administration and welfare of the students.
- The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient.
- The College has a well-planned performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff. They are always motivated and supported for career development and progression.
- The faculties are provided with financial support and provision of leave to attend conferences/seminars/workshops and towards membership fee of professional bodies.

- The College has a mechanism to mobilize funds from different govt. agencies, other sources and uses it optimally for its regular academic activities and development.
- Internal, external and Govt. financial audits are conducted regularly.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes related to academics and administration.
- The IQAC reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals.
- It also records the incremental improvement in various activities.
- There has been a continuous, incremental growth in the post accreditation period by addition of new programmes, organization of seminars/workshops, Career Development and Placement services, upgradation of ICT tools. There is an effective use of ICT in teaching and learning process.
- The quality improvement initiatives are identified and implemented by the IQAC.
- Academic and Administrative Audits are conducted and follow-up action is taken.
- Collaborative quality initiatives with other institutions are taken.
- The college has participated in NIRF and also has successfully completed cycles 1st Cycle of NAAC Accreditation.

- A 10 kw grid solar photovoltaic is already installed as a renewable energy source. Rainwater harvesting facility is to preserve ground water.
- Facilities for differently abled students like ramp, grills, scribes etc. are provided in the college.
- Several initiatives have been taken up based on locational advantages and disadvantages. The college conducted a green audit and energy audit as green campus initiative. The campus of the college is plastic free.
- The college has completed financial, academic and auxiliary functions with transparency mechanism.
- Events for promoting truth, love, non-violence and peace are organized. The college observes the birth and death anniversaries of great personalities.
- The Distinctive practice of the college is 'Karmaveer Bhausaheb Hiray Kavya Karandak', a State-level competition. The Best Practice of the college is 'Niramay Arogya Kendra'. which includes Aapoorva Dattak Yojna, Health Check-up for students and senior citizens, hemoglobin check-up, sickle cell check-up, eye check-up and overall health check-up.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The institution has always been striving for executing and updating a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary education as a need of an hour to let students grab the job opportunities after the completion of their education. Different Certificate courses have been introduced. The crosscutting issues viz. Professional Ethics, Gender, Environmental Sustainability, which are the integral parts of the educational system are sincerely implemented as prescribed in the syllabus and also certain programs are deliberately run through various curricular and extracurricular

	enriches the students' environmental awareness. The Skill Development Program by SPPU is effectively implemented to enhance the communication as well as soft skills related ability of the students. In the future, the provision will be made to offer more interdisciplinary programs for the students of all faculties. The faculty and students have been encouraged to register SWAYAM & NPTL portal to pursue multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary courses.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The university has introduced the Academic Bank of Credits from 2021 - 22 for all its affiliated colleges. We are considering credits that will be earned by students for these courses. Planning to implement the academic Bank of Credits is in progress and will be implemented as per the guidelines of SPPU credit system notification regarding ABC. Awareness program regarding ABC has been conducted at departmental level. The students have registered to ABC to implement NEP.
3. Skill development:	Students are presently being given hands-on training exposure to practical subjects of Computers, Commerce, and Economics through internship programs in banks and offices/shops. Students are getting an opportunity to identify their skills to fabricate some projects and learn the concepts through experiential learning that. Project work is mandatory for all PG students that enhance their practical skills. In future, we will try to get the new schemes launched by UGC's NSQF to expand skill- based education.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Indian Knowledge system which includes knowledge from ancient India and scripts like Modi helps understand history better. The college has already started 'Certificate Course in Modi Lipi', 'Certificate Course in Business Communication' etc. to offer IKS education. The departments like History, Economics, Political Science integrate IKS through regular teaching learning activities like Yuvak Biradari. The field visit to nearby IKS related prominent places such as Temples, Forts, Historical, Mosques, Arts & Crafts communities, have been organised by the college. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The curriculum of all the faculties of Arts, Science, and Commerce were revised step by step from the academic year 2018-2019 onwards by the affiliating university (SPPU). The restructured syllabus prescribed by the affiliating university focuses on Outcomes Based Education (OBE). The examination system was also reviewed and modified to measure the outcome learned by the students. Similarly, the institution implemented all the revised processes of the affiliating university for teaching, learning, and evaluation. The institution adheres to the updates pertaining to outcome-based education. The Outcome Based Education (OBE) Committee has been formed to guide all the departments. From the Academic Year 2021 - 22, the initiative has been taken about the mapping and attainment of Course Outcomes and Program Outcomes; each department is informed to prepare its Program outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes. they are also instructed to display on the departmental notice board for the students. The same POs, COs, and PSOs are also uploaded on the college website.

1. Experiential Learning

- In these field trips, students observe places, collect samples or take photographs for further study.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- The college strictly follows the modalities of conducting the Continuous Internal Assessment as directed by the SPPU.
- The college has appointed the College Examination Officer who heads the College Examination Committee/Cell.
- For CIA in UG programs having semester patterns, a minimum of two unit tests are conducted in each semester for each course. In addition to these, assignments, seminars, and quizzes are used to test students' knowledge.
- The college has an internal squad to check malpractices. Answer-sheets are evaluated in time and marks are communicated to the students.
- For CIA during the two-year postgraduate degree program, CBCS is followed. Internal assessment for UG is 30% and PG is 50% of the marks. Performance of the student is evaluated through assignments, unit tests, attendance, seminar, quizzes, activity assessment through rubrics, projects, and group discussions/presentations.
- The summative assessment tools used for CIA of undergraduate classes are unit tests, projects, attendance, assignments, and presentation. Question papers for all tests and assignments are linked with Course Outcomes.
- For practical courses, the internal assessment includes attendance, preparation, conduction of lab, post-experiment quiz, and practical journal. An evaluation sheet is provided to each teacher.
- Each practical/project session is assessed separately for continuous internal evaluation. For the project, the internal assessment includes attendance, Activity Assessment through rubrics, presentation, abstract-writing, paper-writing, and participation in conference/Avishkar.
- Students' progression towards achieving learning outcomes is monitored by the teacher by using additional tools like open-book tests, oral exams, take-home tests (to test their ability of critical thinking), general questions posed to the class, and instruction is modified as needed from time to time.
- The transparency and effectiveness of the CIA are monitored by College Examination Committee throughout the year.

• The college has provided guidelines for faculty to ensure transparency and robustness in internal/ external assessment as follows:

For Transparency:

- Create awareness amongst students and their parents regarding the assessment process through showcasing notices, academic calendars on the website, and notice boards.
- Communicating the dates of assessments in each semester through notices on boards and email or Google Classroom.
- Create awareness amongst students through orientation held at the beginning of the academic year acquainting them of the syllabus, internal assessment process along assessment tools. After the evaluation, the grades or marks are shown to the students.
- For students who are not able to give internal exams at the scheduled time due to their engagements in sports or other co-curricular activities or due to personal valid reasons, the opportunity is offered to them to reappear for internal tests as per SPPU circular.
- The result of all the internal examinations is declared in time and model answers of the test are discussed with the students.

Grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient:

- Students are given timely opportunities to discuss any concerns or grievances about assessment outcomes.
- Grievances related to assessment are conveyed to the university.
- The photocopy of answer-sheet is made available on students' demand.
- For University/External Exams, provision of rechecking and reverification of the answer sheet pacifies the grievances in time and efficiently.

2.CCTV Surveillance: Along with the security personnel, the campus has a CCTV vigilance system deployed at various locations of the college campus. The live footage is monitored in the Principal's office. The CCTV footage monthly backup is available to monitor.

3.Security Staff: The 24X7 security is managed by duly appointed security guards. This ensures the safeguarding of the students, especially girls, and staff. Security and College Discipline Committee shoulder the responsibility to deal with security glitches if there are any. Complaint Box has been installed in the very façade of the college porch and follow-up is taken by the Students Grievance Committee.

4.Student Welfare Committees: Students' welfare as well as awareness programs are arranged to groom their personality. The program such as Personality Development for girls and Nirbhay Kanya Abhiyan, Hygiene and Sanitation, Psychological Counselling, etc.

5.Other Committees: Women Redressal Cell, Anti-Harassment Committee, and Anti-Ragging Committee organize various programs for Women Empowerment like HB check-up, sickle cell check-up and installation of the Complaint Box in college porch. 1. Title : Niramaya Arogya Kendra

Niramaya Arogya Kendra (Niramay Arogya Centre) is established 4 years back by college according to the guidelines of our parent institution 'Mahatma Gandhi Vidyamandir' in the name of the General Secretary of our institution Dr. Prashant V. Hiray, to deal with health-related issues of students, staff, general public and senior citizens from the vicinity. The Centre generally conducts activities like eye check-up for senior citizens, hemoglobin check-up for girl students, sickle cell check-up for girls, blood donation, psychological counselling and general health check-up. Along with health check-ups the college also organizes various awareness programs, guest lectures, campaigns related to health.

2. Objectives of the Practice

The objective behind starting Niramay Arogya Centre is provide medical facilities to the general public along with the students. Most of the people are not aware about the health-related problems they are facing. In light of this situation the college conducts various activities like eye check-up, hemoglobin

check-up, sickle cell check-up, general health check-up etc.

3. The Context

People are generally not aware of the health-related problems and do not visit to doctors either. People in the rural areas generally avoid to visit doctors due to fear. They directly visit to medical stores and consume medicines without doctor's prescription. This sometimes cause serious medical issues. The college also conducts lectures, inviting doctors and medical professionals for spreading general awareness among the students.

4. The Practice

The Centre generally conducts activities like eye check-up for senior citizens, hemoglobin check-up for girl students, sickle cell check-up for girls, blood donation, psychological counselling and general health check-up. Along with health check-ups the college also organizes various awareness programs, guest lectures, campaigns related to health. The doctors invited for check-ups are generally Bachelors in Medicine. During Eye-check up the doctors also provide eye drops to the patient for free. During hemoglobin check-up the doctors provide folic acid tablets and zinc tablets for iron deficiency if any.

5. Evidence of Success

The college has achieved success in spreading awareness among parents, students and people in the vicinity. People have shed their fear of doctors and medical treatment. They now freely tell their medical condition if any either to the centre coordinator or they can directly visit to the doctor or public health centre nearby.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

At initial stage the centre has encountered many problems. The first and foremost problem the centre has encountered is to spread general awareness about health-related issues. The centre conducted various activities like campaign, rallies, health lectures for spreading awareness. The second problem the centre encountered is to deal with the fear, the students and people having regarding visiting the doctors. To deal with this situation the college conducted various health check-ups in the college itself. This college was successful in winning the trust of the people. Due to this trust the college has been carrying this practice successfully from last four years.
